CAMPUS NEWS ROUNDUP

Plan To Change Social Studies Courses Offered

New Teaching Method And Textbooks Needed

The type of teacher education in social studies at every California school will be changed, according to Dr. Joe Apple, professor of education. The State Department of Education presented a tentative plan for the new social studies courses at a regional conference here Saturday.

Reactions from the SDS conference along with findings from 11 other state-wide conferences will be compiled with reactions from other study groups and will be used by the State Department of Education to set up the new program.

NEW TEXT BOOKS

Besides the new teacher training program, the plan will call for writing new textbooks, according to Apple. The state is making an effort to design a social studies program to fit the needs of a dynamically changing California. A program for American citizens deeply concerned with the problems brought on by America's new position in international affairs by the cold war and by the advent of Sputnik," Apple said.

One part of this large scale effort is in re-defining the type of American history that should be taught, at what levels, and in what way, to produce the type of citizens needed in a world in crisis," he said.

The revision program has involved some 3000 school administrators, supervisors, and social studies teachers in California, plus several thousand other professional and lay citizens.

NAME PLANNERS

The conference Saturday was sponsored by the State Department of Education, SDS,

and San Diego city and county schools. It was planned and directed by a local social studies planning committee composed of Miss Marguerite Paradise, director of curriculum for the city schools; Dr. Paul Zintgraff, assistant supervisor of the county schools; De Groll Platte, secondary coordinator for the county schools; Fred Wilson, director of elementary instruction in the city schools and Dr. Joe A. Apple, who was chairman of the conference.

The presentation of the design was made by Mr. Kenneth Imel and Martha MacIntosh, administrators in the city school system and members of the State Central Committee on Social Studies.

ADDRESS GIVEN

Preceding this presentation was an address on "The Place of Social Education in the American Society", by Sheldon Campbell, Director of Training, Rohr Aircraft Corporation.

Following the presentations, the new design was analyzed and evaluated in 15 study groups of 15 members each under leadership teams of 3. The conferees were especially selected and invited to attend this evaluation conference. About 100 of the evaluators were from the city schools, 100 from the county, 50 from lay organizations and 30 from SDS.

Mrs. Jane Hood, Assistant State Superintendent and Dr. George Roehr, consultant for the State Department of Education, were also in attendance.

Applications Available For Life Guard Jobs

Civil service is now accepting applications for lifeguards. T. O'Reily of the civil service announced that 45 recruits are needed by June to patrol San Diego beaches.

Applicants must be between 18 and 30, with minimum height of 5 feet, seven inches, 150 pounds, and 20-20 vision. "No special training is required, the only thing necessary is to know how to swim," O'Reily said.

Applications may be picked up now in Room 453 of the Civic Center, or call BE-9-7511, extension 261 for a mailed application. April 3 is the date of the first examination which is a swimming test. Any additional training will be taught later. Testing will be every two or three weeks after April 3 until June. Starting salary is \$282.00 a month.

Amendments on Ballot

Two amendments to the AS Articles of Incorporation will be included on Wednesday's election ballot.

The first one will read "Vote yes or no to strike out 'at large' in Section 8 of the Articles of Incorporation, which now reads '13 representatives to the Student Council of SDS chosen at large.'"

The second one will read "Section 8, Articles of Incorporation, change the words 'Dean of Men at SDS and Dean of Women at SDS' to 'Dean of Activities at SDS and Activities Adviser at SDS.'"

TWO INTERPRETATIONS

The passage of the first amendment would make no change in current election practices at SDS. If the amendment were defeated, however, a new system of elections would have to be considered.

As the provision now stands in the Articles of Incorporation, the manner of electing officers is not stated definitely. It is open to two interpretations. This fact came to the attention of the student body last fall when former Graduate Representative Stan Stewart questioned the AS Council as to the legality of election procedures here.

NOT LEGAL ISSUE

After a lengthy legal investigation it was found that no question of legality existed, but rather that the question was one of interpretation.

Under one interpretation of Section 8 of the Articles of Incorporation all qualified voters on the campus would be eligible to vote for all members of

the AS Council. This would include class representatives and upper and lower division representatives. The words 'chosen at large' in Article 8 support this interpretation.

Article 9, however, authorizes the election procedure to be set up under the AS By Laws. The By-Laws have been organized so that voters must qualify by class standing to vote for class and division representatives. This is the second interpretation, the one currently being followed

MEANING DEFINED

The proposed change in Article 8—eliminating the words 'at large'—will leave the Articles and By-Laws open only to the latter interpretation.

The second amendment is much simpler. It is merely a change in titles to bring the Articles of Incorporation up to date with current administrative organization.







In the sprints, the Aztecs will depend on top man Bill Ratelle. Other Aztec sprinters are Bernie Stolzoff, Glenn Ray, Paul Rushing, Bill Clark and Stuart Bender. Jack Sweet, who has showed much progress is out with injuries.

Jack Ratelle will lead the 440 men. Ratelle took first place in the UCLA-Redlands meet by running the quarter-mile in a 50.1 time.

Mike Muirhead and Ray Swain lead the 880 men. The half-milers are Clarence Hagen and Bill Gallaher.

Hagen and Gallaher are San Diego's two top milers. Gallaher set a new school record last year by running a mile in 4:16.4.

Red Ghering is the Aztec's best man in the high hurdles. Jim Carmean is the speedster in the lows.

Jim Terry is the top pole vaulter, and is backed up by Roy Radley and Paul DeLoach.

San Diego's hopes in the high jump lie with Phil Rogers and Ken Holmes who both jump over 6 feet.

Russ Himmer leads the roadjumpers. Behind him are Holmes and Jon Orvick. Himmer can jump 22 feet.


