

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP

ARTICLE XIV AMENDMENTS New Section 2

These Bylaws may plso be amended by an approving vote of two-thirds of a These Byla is may also be aniended by an approving vote of two-thirds of a quorum of members of the Association at a regular or special meeting of the Association, or by two-thirds of the eligible voters of the Association at a regular or special election, such meeting or election being called either by the President of the Associated Students of his own choice, or on demand of a simple majority vote of the entire membership of the Student Council, or on demand of a spetition signed by ten per cent of the total membership of the Association.

New Section 4:

The Articles of Incorporation of the Association may be amended by an approving vote of two-thirds of a quorum of members of the Association at a regular or special meeting of the Association or by two-thirds of the eligible voters of the Association at a regular or special election; such meetin gor election being called either by the President of the!

of the Association at a regular or special election; such meetin gor election being called either by the President of the

The following changes in the Associated Students By-Laws are published for the convenience of the student body.

This is the second time the charges have been published in The Aztec.

Proposed Amendments to Bylaws

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP

Associated Students of his own choice, or on demand of a simple majority vote of the entire membership of the Association; provided however that any such amendment be also adorted by the Student Council upon a majority approxing vote of its entire membership, which approving vote may be given either before or after the action taken on the Amendment by the membership of the Association.

New Section 5:

Amendments to the Articles of Incorporation of the Association become effective only after adoption and on the date specificed therein.
