# AS Council Accepts New Aztec Editor

A joint dinner meeting of the Personnel Management Association, Tau Sigma and Pi Phi Epsilon will be held at 6 p.m. on Jan. 8 in the Home Economics building.

Speakers from the various industries throughout San Diego will be on campus every day at instructors' request.

Seniors are urged to file their folders with the Placement Office. Information on folders can be obtained from the placement office.

## CORRECTION

Tuesday's Aztec carried an erroneous headline for a Page 1 story. Freshman Class President Ron Creigh said tentative possibilities for the bands include Les Brown and Stan Kenton.

Applications for Belle of the Ball Candidates may be obtained at BA105, Bob Clark, lower division representative, said. Candidates must be freshman women. The deadline for applications is Jan. 3.

Committee chairmen chosen at last week's meeting are Lois Fishburn, corsages and trophies; Don Kraush, off-campus publicity, and Doris Johnson, band and ballroom.

"There is a lot of work to be done on the dance and we need everyone's support to make it a success. We encourage every freshman to show his school spirit by becoming active in the Freshman Class," Creigh said.

The Sophomore Class cabinet Tuesday chose Don Doctor to head the class activities committee and Marla Brown as constitution committee chairman.

The council questioned Sullivan closely as to his policy for the paper next semester and also about his qualifications for the position of editor. Blessing told the council that the Board had selected Sullivan over senior Larry Townsend because he has good potential as an editor and a good journalism background. Blessing would not give any more reasons for selecting Sullivan because he said Publications Board discussions on this subject are confidential.

In other business AS Vice President Bill Nugent said that the deadline for scheduling events on the master calendar to be distributed at registration is Jan. 3.

Miss Wilson, who left the council last week because illness had caused her to miss three meetings, was reappointed upper division representative. Judy Kuykendall, junior, and Norm McAbee, senior, also applied.

Mike Sullivan gave the report of the Hungarian Student Scholarship Program. He said that the committee was one year old and of the \$3300 collected originally, \$1300 remained. The money is used for tuition, books and maintenance (if needed).

The council designated Nov. 1, 1958 as the date of Homecoming next year. Activities Adviser Alan S. Mischne recommended this date, the Fresno State game.

 "Let's go boys, they're others need be fried!"

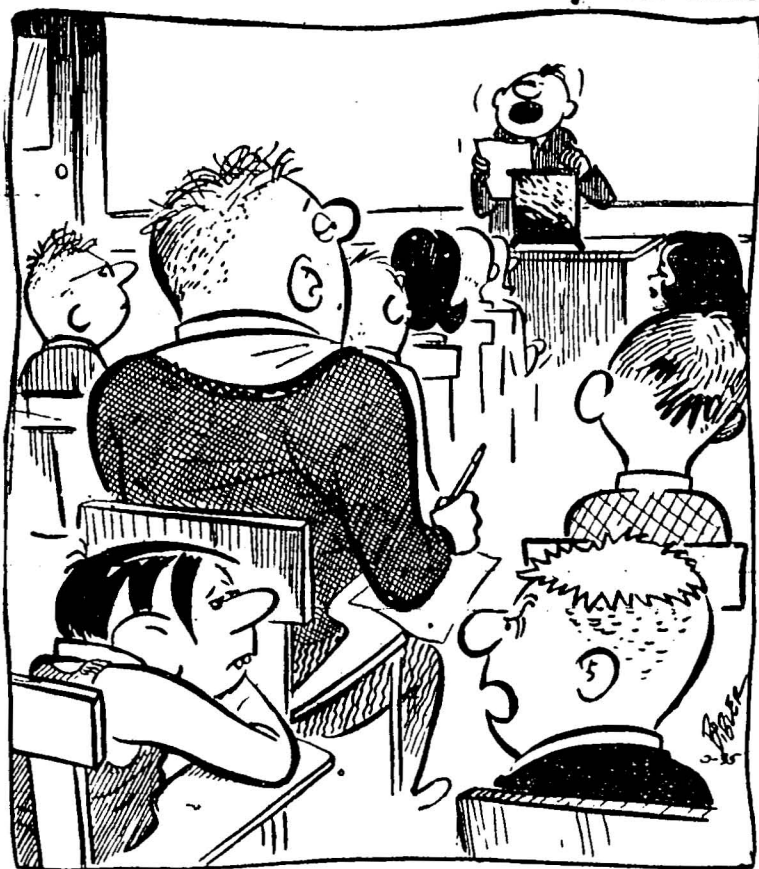

## Council By-Law Changes

The following changes in the Associated Students By-Laws are published for the convenience of the student body.

This is the second time the charges have been published in The Aztec.

## Proposed Amendments to Bylaws

## ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP

## New Section 5

Each member of the Association in good standing in any of the classes of membership enumerated above shall be entitled to one vote at any special or regular meeting of members on any question that may arise.

## ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

## New Section 5

Ten per cent of the total membership of the Association shall constitute a quorum for all regular and special meetings of the membership of the Association.

## ARTICLE XIV AMENDMENTS

## New Section 2

These Bylaws may also be amended by an approving vote of two-thirds of a quorum of members of the Association at a regular or special meeting of the Association, or by two-thirds of the eligible voters of the Association at a regular or special election, such meeting or election being called either by the President of the Associated Students of his own choice, or on demand of a simple majority vote of the entire membership of the Student Council, or on demand of a petition signed by ten per cent of the total membership of the Association.

## New Section 4

The Articles of Incorporation of the Association may be amended by an approving vote of two-thirds of a quorum of members of the Association at a regular or special meeting of the Association or by two-thirds of the eligible voters of the Association at a regular or special election; such meeting or election being called either by the President of the

Associated Students of his own choice, or on demand of a simple majority vote of the entire membership of the Student Council, or on demand of a petition signed by ten per cent of the total membership of the Association; provided however that any such amendment be also adopted by the Student Council upon a majority approving vote of its entire membership, which approving vote may be given either before or after the action taken on the Amendment by the membership of the Association.

## New Section 5:

Amendments to the Articles of Incorporation of the Association become effective only after adoption and on the date specified therein.

Tabby's not so dumb. He's been to school. In fact, he's been to college. He spent the whole day here Tuesday.

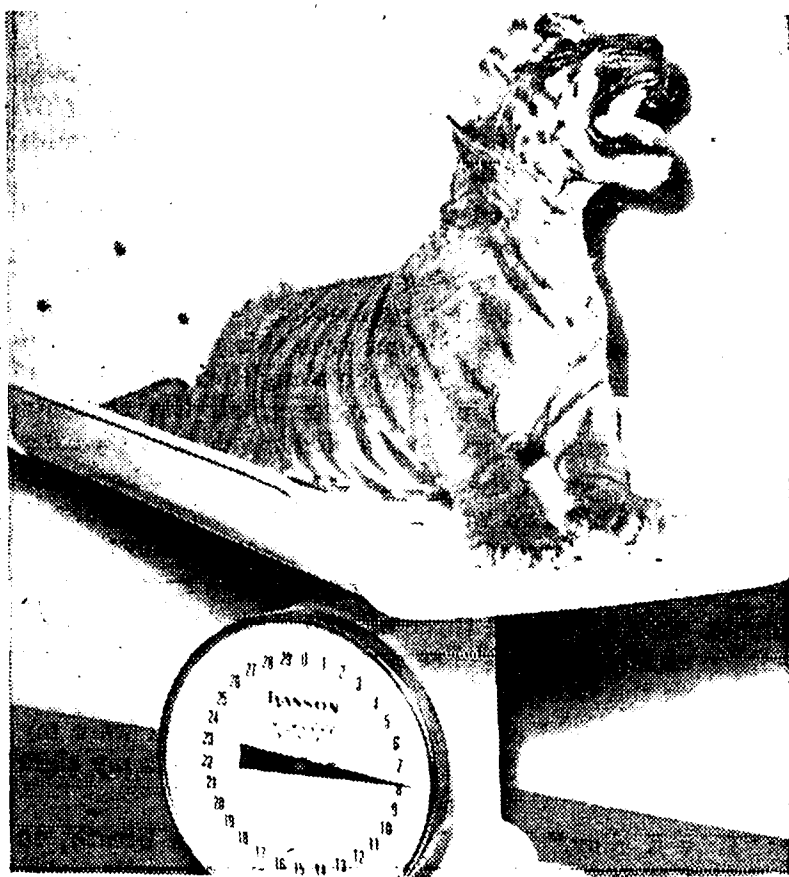

"Four persons, including three San Diego State College students, were killed and three other persons are in critical condition at Mercy Hospital as a result of a two-car, head-on smash-up on the Cabrillo Freeway this afternoon."

Two of the dead ones and one of the injured were my students, thought Mr. S. Three students who sat in my class day after day.

"Take it easy," said Mr. Smith, under his breath, to the last figure going out the door. "For Heaven's sake, take it easy!"

## Repeat Suggestion

The Associated Student Council still isn't paying much attention to lawbreakers on campus—not even after having the offenses pointed out to them in an Aztec editorial last week.

Numerous signs and posters are still defacing college property. Good examples are to be found around the entrances to the Humanities and Social Sciences building.

The Associated Students do have a publicity code. The code prohibits signs defacing college property. Everyone knows that such a code is valueless unless it is properly enforced. Everyone, that is, except the Associated Student Council!

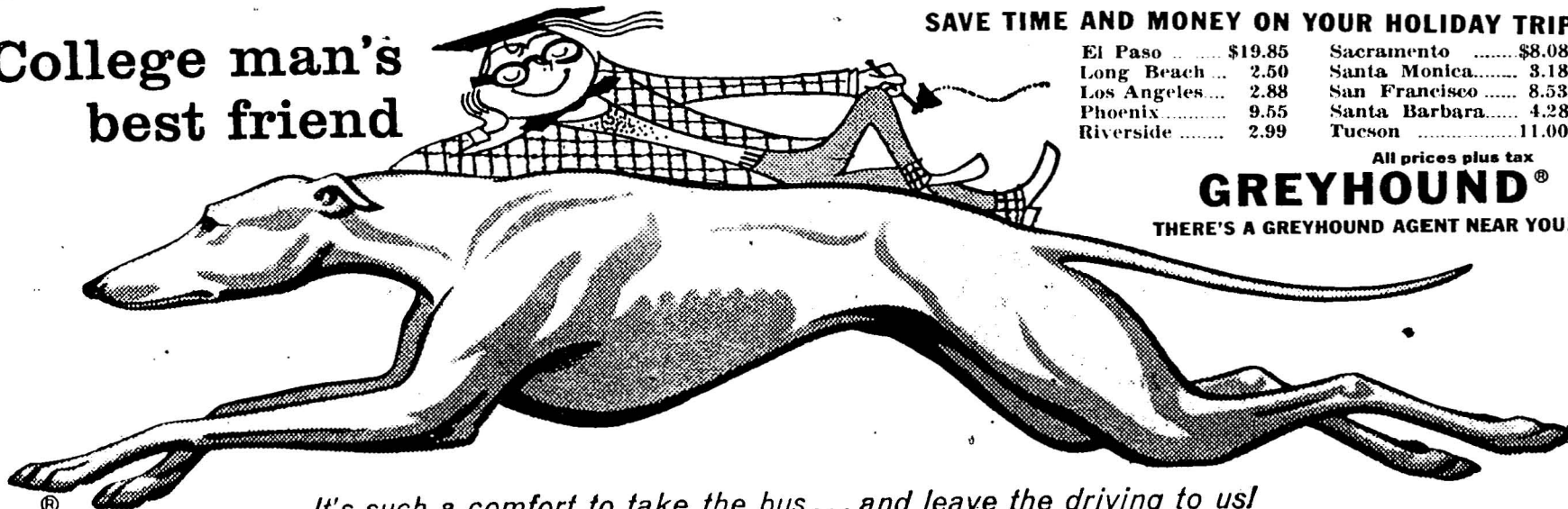

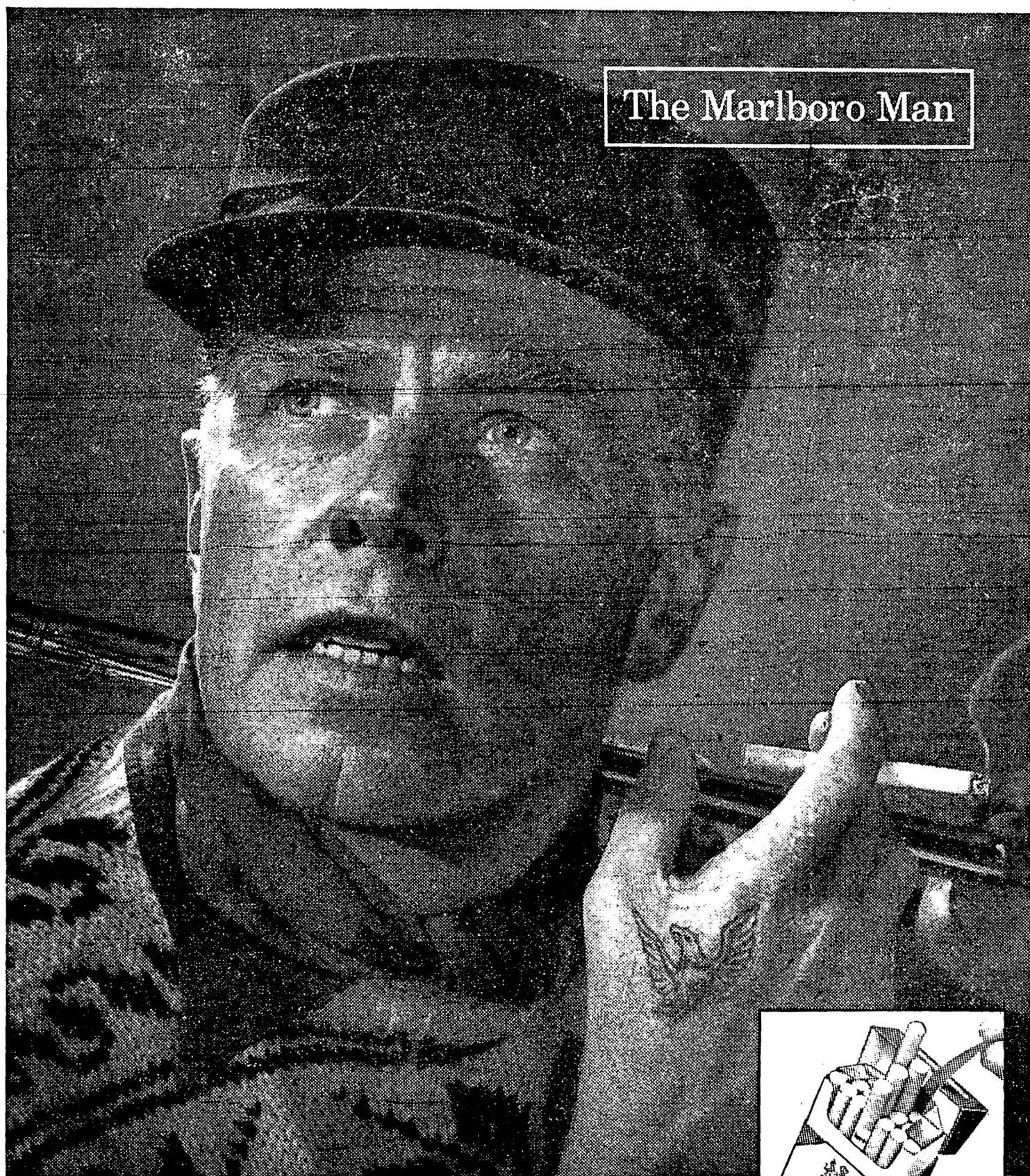
For the cold winter evenings, a long cashmere coat is perfect. Also, this semester, the car coats in many unusual and different styles are popular.

## Dimes Theme Set; Drive Starts Soon

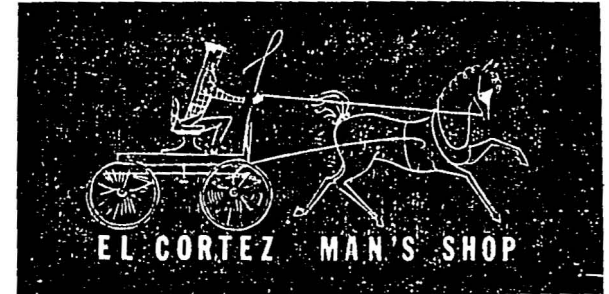
"Survival Is Not Enough" is the theme of the March of Dimes campaign which will begin throughout San Diego County Jan. 2.

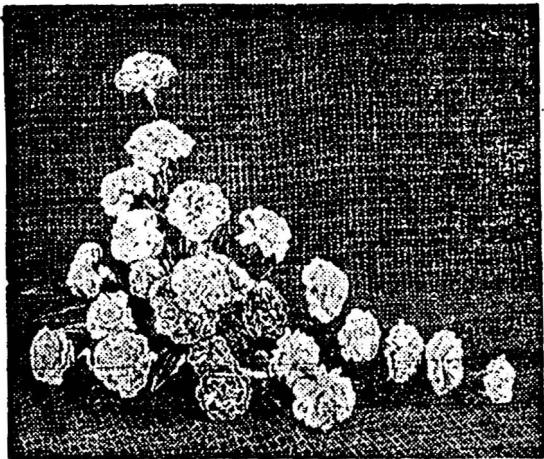

## SDS Veteran Cites 37 Year Service

China, Australia, the Rakehanga Islands, Nicaragua and Antarctica are a few of the places Ernest (Bulldog) Freeman, M.Sgt., USMC, ret., can call home.

Freeman, five-time winner of the Silver Star and a sophomore here, served 37 years in the Marine Corps, enlisting in 1906. He retired in 1938, but went back during World War II.

The aggressive 67-year-old saw action with the First Marines in China and then in Nicaragua. When World War I started, Freeman was stationed at Quantico, Va., where he was a drill instructor. He was among the first to be sent overseas.

For valor above and beyond the call of duty, Freeman was awarded the Presidential Citation and two purple hearts in the battles of Chateau-Tierre and Bellou Woods.

His hobbies include fishing, mountain climbing, sailing, and reading. "I'm 67 years old now and I'll live to be a hundred or die trying," he said. "I am physically and mentally perfect and plan to stay that way for quite a while," he added.

The partially bald, stocky ex-

marine makes his home in Del Mar. He has been attending SDS intermittently since 1953. He takes only courses which interest him the most. "I've missed a lot of formal education during my life and I intend to make it up now, although I'm not planning to get a degree," he said.

Freeman is a confirmed bachelor and plans to stay that way. "That is, unless one of these cute little coeds take my eye. I'm a better man than most of these knuckleheads attending this institution and I bet I could show some of these chickens a better time too," he said.

He said that the trouble with the world today is that too many people lock themselves in a glass box when they reach 60. "Why, life hasn't even started until you reach that age," the burly bachelor added.

Between the two wars, "the Bulldog" spent most of his time serving in the Pacific. At the onset of World War II, he voluntarily went back into the Corps. He was an aid to General Randolph McPate and served at Tarawa, the Bikinis and other Pacific islands.

When the war ended, Freeman finally retired, although he tried to get back in during the Korean conflict. "They said I was too old. Why, I'm a better man today than half those whippersnappers they call Marines," he said.

With an almost unnoticeable stoop in his shoulders, Freeman said that he wasn't the least bit ashamed to be going to school at his age. "Embarrassed? Why, I'm mighty proud I'm still young enough not to be embarrassed."

Freeman said that if he ever got the traveling bug again he would pick up stakes and leave. He said that he likes San Diego better than any other American city. He likes SDS and will probably stay for some time.

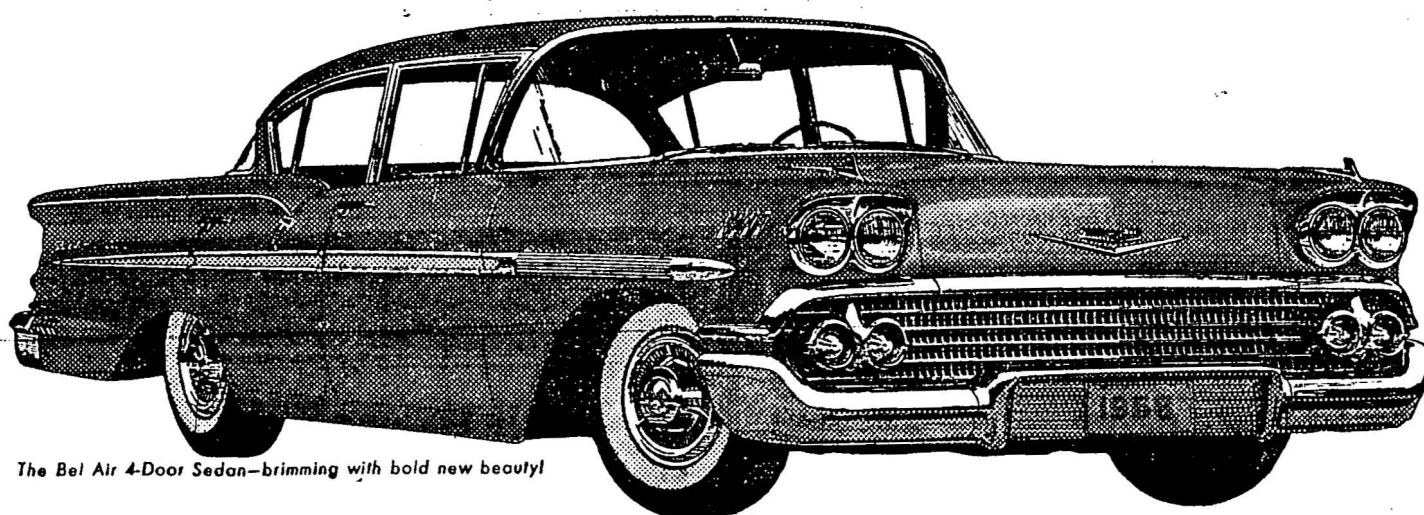

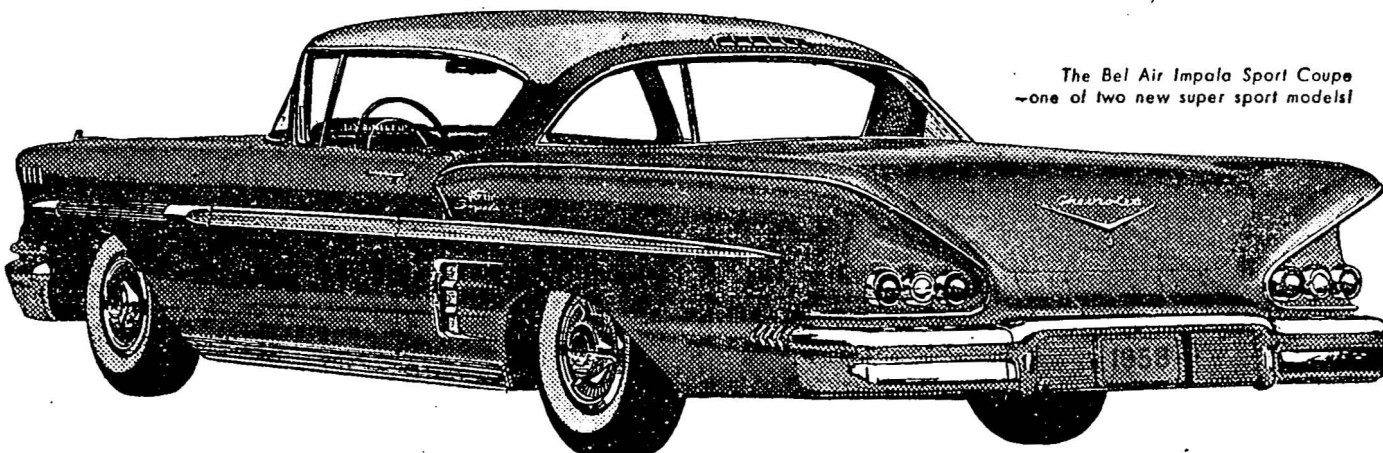

San Diego State's varsity cagers look for their second win in five starts tonight, as they meet a strong Whittier College quintet in the Whittier gym at 8 p.m.

The Aztecs will be out to avenge two losses, 71-70, and 61-58, suffered at the hands of the Poets last season.

## Aztecs On Fire

Whittier will be faced with the task of putting out the fire of the San Diego squad that started in the second half of the game against Marine Corps Recruit Depot Friday night, and continued on to the Aztecs last contest against Presidio of San Francisco Saturday night.

In the final half of the Marine game, the Aztecs outscored the Leathernecks 33-23, and continued the scoring streak by defeating a favored Presidio of San Francisco team 64-51.

## San Diego Loses

San Diego's lost games have been to the Alumni, 62-57, Pasadena College (Nazarene), 98-72, and Marine Corps Recruit Depot by a close 56-52 score.

In their first three games it looked like the Aztec club would be less than mediocre, especially after losing so convincingly to Pasadena. The picture completely changed, however, as the Montezuma quintet came to life and dropped Presidio of San Francisco, who had badly defeated Pasadena in a scrimmage game earlier in the season.

## Aztec High Point Men

Sparkling the Aztecs in the scoring department are guards Blake Neal and Arch Rambeau, and forward Bill Gillespie. Both Neal and Rambeau have hit for 44 points in four games for a 11.0 average per game, and Gillespie has scored 42 points in four games for a 10.5 average. Other high scorers are forwards Ray Waters and Bernie Finley, who have tallied for 25 and 21 points, respectively.

San Diego has scored most impressively on jump shots from 10 to 15 feet away from the basket, with Neal, Rambeau, and Gillespie leading the way. Others that have looked impressive are Finley, Waters, and guards Hal Brown and Bernie Revak.

## Noonan in Slump

Under the basket, pivot man Tom Noonan, who was expected to carry much of the Aztec scoring load this year has so far scored

only one field goal, and five free throws, for a total of seven points. If Noonan starts scoring as he has already proven he can, the Aztecs will be much tougher.

Gerry Mulder and freshman Steve Evans have both looked good at the center position. Evans, who started against MCRD has looked particularly tough on rebounds.

## Aztec Probable Starters

Against Whittier, Aztec mentor George Ziegenfuss will probably start Neal 6-0 and Rambeau 6-1 at guards, Gillespie 6-3 and Waters 6-2 at forwards, and either

Whittier, will be looking for their third win of the season. So far they have dumped La Verne College 64-60, Arizona State at Flagstaff 82-58, and lost to Chapman College 72-56 Tuesday night.

## Ogle Leads Poets

The Poets are led by 6-6 pivot man John Ogle. In four games he is averaging 18 points and 14 rebounds.

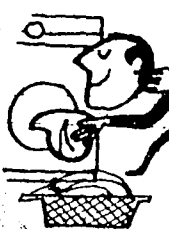

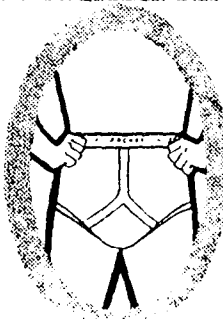
