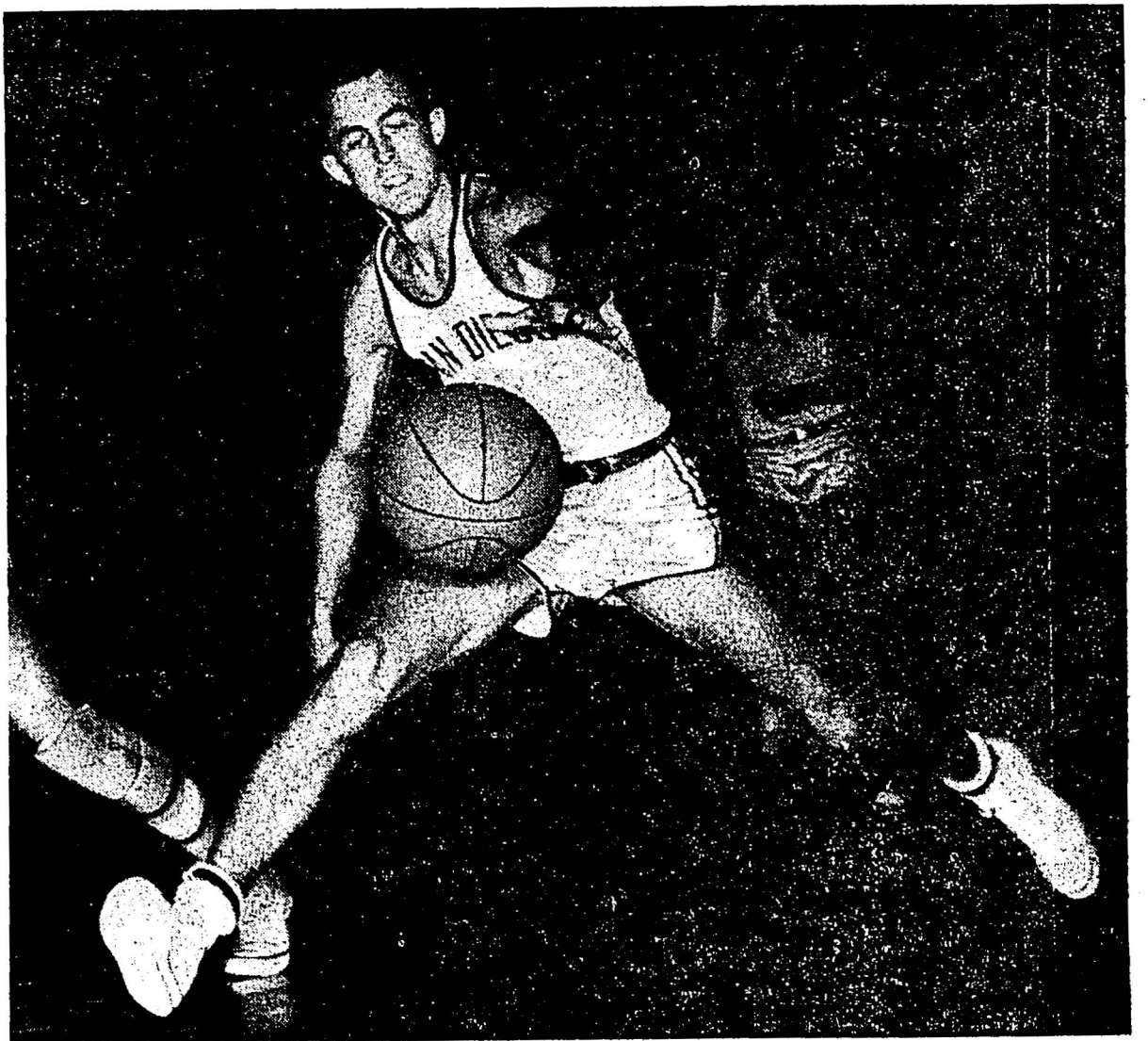

Gray Named To Succeed Walker As Guidance Dean

Resigning Dean Accepts New Position Created At San Fernando State College

President Malcolm A. Love officially announced today the resignation of Dr. Donald E. Walker, dean of guidance and testing, a member of the SDS faculty since 1949.

Walker's resignation of March 1, 1959, will be effective at the end of the semester at San Fernando State College, Los Angeles. He came to SDS in 1949 as a member of the psychology staff and has held his present position since 1954.

Robert T. Gray, currently assistant director of guidance, has been selected to succeed Walker, Dr. Love said.

WENT TO MATHEMATICS

Gray was an officer in the Naval Reserve during World War II, attending Kansas State College and the University of Kansas. He taught mathematics at Topeka High School for three years and returned to the University of Kansas in 1946 to continue work towards his doctorate.

Gray was assistant director of guidance, reading and learning methods since 1951-1952 at Wichita University. He came to SDS the summer of 1952 as assistant director of Bureau of Educational Research and Service and as an instructor in education at the university from 1952-53.

JOINED SDS IN 1956

After receiving his doctorate in education, Gray was on the Central State faculty for three years as a director of testing and a professor of education. He joined the SDS faculty in the summer of 1956 as a test officer. In addition to his responsibilities of directing the counseling and testing programs here, Gray has directed campus veterans' activities.

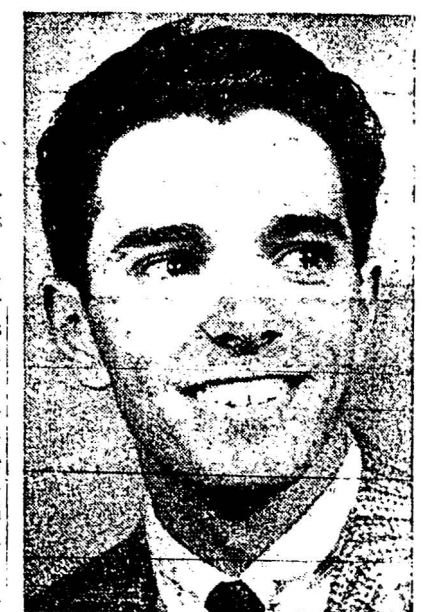
The council also accepted two new organizations for on-campus status: the Oriental Students Club and Brocas, an organization for those interested in correction of speech and hearing defects.

Labor Institute Opens

The Institute of Labor Economics, a research project in labor problems, was recently opened by the Economics Department, according to Dr. Frederick Ryan, head of the Institute. Mainly concerned with problems in San Diego and Latin America, the Institute will try to give as broad an interest as possible with emphasis on business and social science, Dr. Ryan said. An immediate purpose of the project is to have material available for seniors and graduates doing research papers, he stated.

An economics library, the Institute has many volumes and research papers written by experts in the labor problems field. Dr. Robert Barkley, professor of economics, began collecting material for the Institute about three years ago. With the completion of the Humanities Building the Institute was organized. The Labor Council of San Diego and the State Department of Education donated money for the project, Ryan said.

A 70-year-old newspaper, printed in the past, traveled to the moon, Venus, and Mars in 1962 is just one is in a valuable collection, representing 55 years of continuous work by a local resident.

The collector, Howard P. Jackson, an 84-year-old widower and veteran of five wars, told a History of Mass. Communication class he has been collecting newspapers since he was in the Battle of Manila during the Spanish-American War. His collection dates back to 1871.

Jack on his copies of the first continuously published newspaper in the United States, the Boston News-Letter dated in 1704, the first issue of Horace Greeley's New York Tribune, and a George Washington burial account, dated January 4, 1800.

The most up-to-date coverages by Jackson are complete issues covering World War I, World War II, and the Korean War. Jackson himself has been in the Spanish-American War, the Philippine Insurrection, the Cuban War, the Mexican Campaign, and World War I.

Jackson is a member of the International Newspaper Collector's Club, which has about 50 members. He has been told his collection is one of the most valuable.

According to Jackson his collection weighs approximately 2800 pounds and is insured for \$16,000. In recent months he has prepared an inventory and catalogued the issues.

"Everybody should have a hobby. I have three. My newspaper collecting, gardening, and cooking," he said.

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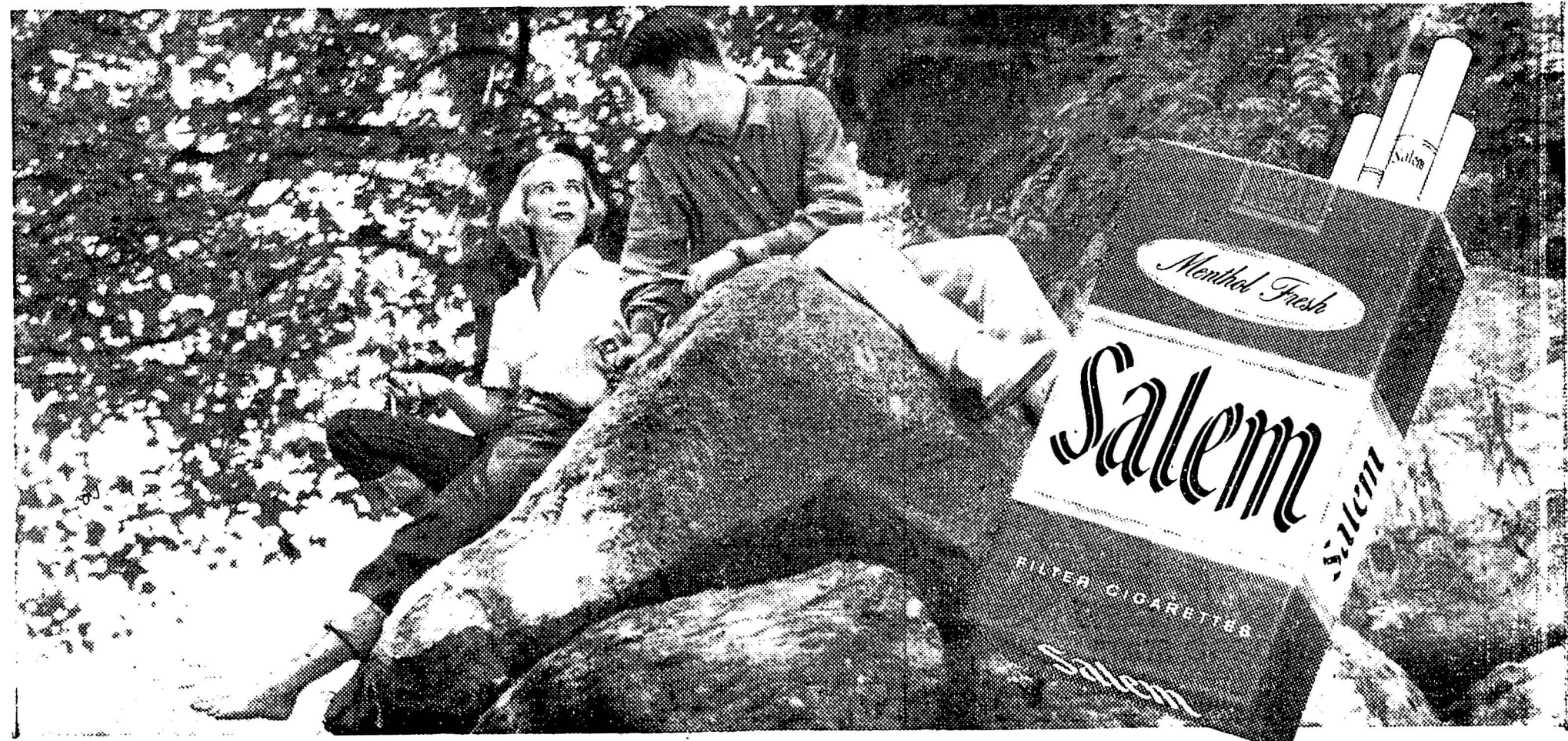

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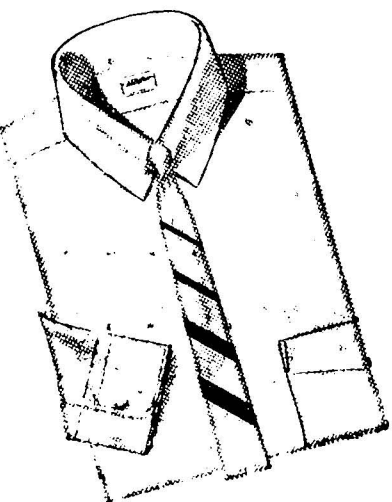

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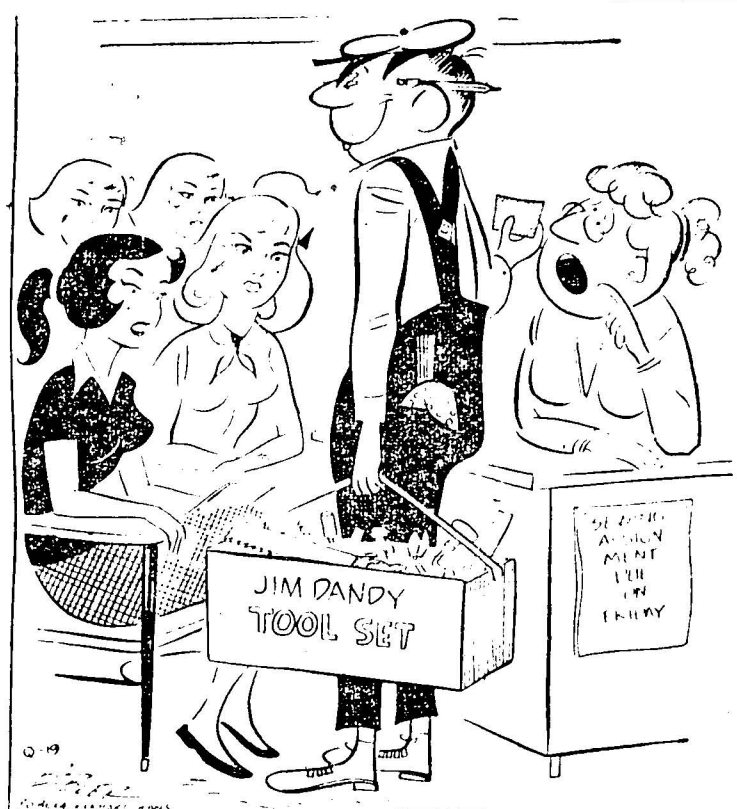

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Rambeau Praises Fine School Spirit As Reason For Aztec Court Success

The spirit with which SDS fans have supported their basketball team during the past years was praised highly by Rambeau, recently graduated hoop wizard, in a recent interview.

"When I first came to State I had little previous contact with San Diego sports fans. I realized that many times it was the tremendous school spirit of the fans displayed that carried the team on to victory," Rambeau said.

NAMED FOR SPIRIT

The telephone voice of the flashy 22-year-old cage ace carried the brand of driving, team spirit for which he has become famous on Southern California courts.

The first two years I was at SDS we had real smooth experienced players on the team and worked with each other in the past. This year there were few returning letters and it was obvious, from the way we played at home in comparison to the way we played at other courts, that support of the fans meant a great deal to the team," Rambeau said.

BORN IN TEXAS

Rambeau has had enough experience on basketball teams to enable him to evaluate the Aztecs accurately. Born June 30, 1935, in El Paso, Texas, he attended Linderoth Elementary School in Los Angeles before entering Lynwood High where he became one of the most consistent high scorers on the squad. He was an All-San Gabriel Valley League player and in 1953 was named Player of the Year and Most Valuable Player by both his team and the league.

At Compton JC Rambeau was with an 18.7 average, and Tony Pinkins was graduated last June in his second year with a 19.6 mark.

The tremendous ability of wiry, six-foot-one, 150-pound Rambeau was recognized by hoop mentor George (Ziggy) Ziegenfuss soon after Rambeau arrived at SDS in the fall of 1955, and his three-year career as the varsity's shifty playmaking guard began.

RAMBEAU RECORDS

Rambeau's 1956-1957 record shows these remarkable statistics: 93 rebounds, a 46.5 shooting percentage, and a 9.7 point average per game. During that season, Rambeau fully established himself as one of the leading back-court men in the southland.

Rambeau wound up his portion of the current season with a 15.7 scoring average. This was the third highest mark (at graduation) achieved by an Aztec cage-porting team. That's all they'll man during recent years. Bob Brady was graduated in, 1954 on," he said.

Although a father (a son, Dee Michael, six pounds two ounces, Feb. 19) and employed by Rohr Aircraft Co. as an industrial engineer with a Bachelor of Science degree in business management, Rambeau still finds time for basketball. He is currently a member of the California Electric Works AAU squad, which has a 17-4 won-lost record this season.

FANS MISS ARCHIE

Despairing fans have rated Rambeau's loss to the team as a decisive blow to the Aztec's hopes of retaining the CCAA crown. Strangely enough, Rambeau himself discounts his own importance to the squad.

"That's a great bunch of fellows with a lot of desire playing for State this season. My only wish is to see the fans keep supporting them. That's all they'll need to go all the way from now on," he said.

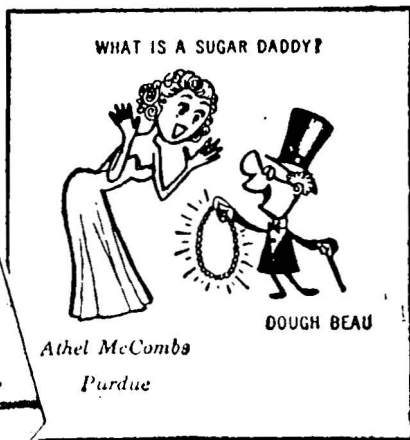
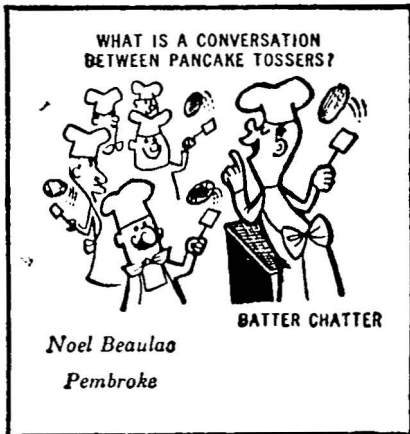

The Aztecs have lost several men to the draft, and others are scholastically ineligible.

In that meet, top Aztec Stan Levin took three first places, three seconds and a third.

Athletic Foundation Chooses Rambeau 'Star Of The Month'

Archie Rambeau, former sharpshooting guard of the varsity basketball team, has been elected Star of the Month of January by the Breitbard Athletic Foundation. Managing Director F. Whitney said.

Rambeau, who graduated at the end of the semester, set a new SDS season record for accuracy by firing field goals at a .59 clip.

During January, the six-foot-one Aztec team captain had an even higher accuracy record, tallying 52 field goals in 96 attempts for an average of .541. He also made 27 out of 32 free throw attempts for an .843 average during January.

His accuracy marks include hitting 107 field goals in 204 attempts and 67 out of 84 free throws. Rambeau tallied a total of 281 points for the season for a per game average of 15.7 points.

Rambeau was also cited by the foundation for his outstanding qualities of leadership, team spirit and sportsmanship.

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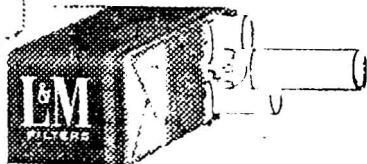
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
