Panelists Reveal That Good Moral Example In Home Curbs Delinquency

To help prevent juvenile delinquency parents should set a good moral example for their children at home, according to three authorities who spoke in IS101 on the topic, "What Must We Do Now to Prevent the Delinquent." The panel discussion was held last Friday.

Speakers were John A. Pennock, director of San Diego County Co-ordinating Councils; Nort Sanders, director of the Los Angeles County Probation Department, and Heman G. Stark, director of the California Youth Authority.

According to Pennock, one reason for this country's delinquency problem is because the father has lost his place as household boss. He feels that fathers should rule with love and kindness, but with firmness, making sure their children understand the position of law-abiding citizen in the world.

"Citizen apathy and lethargy are prevalent in this country when it comes to juvenile delinquency. We seem to be content to let our children go somewhere else besides the home for help. The moral responsibility is pushed on the school and church," Pennock said. "But if more parents would take time with their children, showing their love and setting good examples for them, delinquency would diminish and become a minor problem."

Pennock said that San Diego citizens are trying to set up an integrated, well planned and well staffed community program to prevent delinquency in this area. He also added that he did not find such co-operative citizen spirit throughout the rest of the country during his recent travels.

"The American people seem to be willing to spend unlimited amounts of money on recreational facilities such as boy and girl clubs. But they won't go out on a limb and spend the necessary money for individual treatment of the minority that become delinquents," he said.

According to Stark, parents and the school should try to find what line of work a youth is best suited for and let him pursue it. "Delinquents are individuals who usually have been thwarted and frustrated in what they wanted. Almost every delinquent, who makes good, was reached by a person who expressed confidence in him, made him believe in himself, and made him want to change," he said.

Sanders added to this point. "The dissatisfaction of a youth is an example of inadequate planning on the part of his parents. Such youths will meet the test of good moral behavior if their parents let them know how important they are to them and what is expected of them," he said.

Institute Continues Series With Talk By Convair V. P.

B. F. Coggan, vice president of Convair, will speak at 6 p.m. this evening at a Middle Management Institute dinner in the C.I.S. cafeteria. "Managers in Social Situation," is Coggan's topic.

Saturday at 9:30 a.m., Dr. Neil Lamb, long range planning administrator of Convair, will address the Institute in ED155, on "Long Range Planning and the Manager."

These discussions are second in a series of the Institute of Middle Management which began March 14 and will run through May 10. This Institute has been organized by the American Society of Training Directors in cooperation with SDS. Its purpose is to give managers and supervisors advanced training in the principles of management.

Participants in the Institute are from various companies or governmental agencies in the San Diego area and are selected by their employers.

The Institute consists of 10 meetings and 30 hours of work, with a maximum of 30 participants. The fee is \$125 and include Friday dinner and Saturday lunch. Three units of Extension Division credit and a certificate of completion is presented at the close of the course.

Alpha Phi Omega Awarded Redbook Printing Contract

The AS Council confirmed a Publications Board report Monday that authorized Alpha Phi Omega service organization to print the Redbook next year. Alpha Phi Omega has printed the Redbook in the past but failed to get one out this year. Lower Division Representative Ed Blessing, who gave the Publications Board report, said that the Board had requested interested organizations to submit plans for printing the Redbook and that Alpha Phi Omega was the only applicant.

The report also included a recommendation that the Del Sud editor be paid \$100 and his staff receive free yearbooks. Blessing said that 75 complimentary yearbooks will be ordered. He also said 300 more yearbooks than are paid for by today's deadline would be ordered for late-comers.

MONEY REQUEST DENIED

The Council turned down a Finance Committee recommendation that \$193 be allocated to AWS to pay expenses for a delegate to a regional AWS convention at Washington State soon. The Council sent the recommendation back to committee for further consideration.

The Council allocated \$25 from the contingency fund to the Traditions Committee for the rededication of Hello Walk.

BAD NEWS RECEIVED

AS Secretary Carol Cotton reported she had received a letter from the San Diego Transit System in answer to the council's request for lower fares on the College avenue bus.

The letter said that it was up to the State Public Utilities Commission to change the rates so the Council would have to write to them. Also, the letter said that the Transit System was currently petitioning the PUC for a general increase in rates. The letter also pointed out that the company is already losing money on the College avenue bus.

NEW GROUP ON CAMPUS

Three organizations were declared on campus after filing charters with the Activities Office, and a new organization was given on-campus status.

New to the campus is the Quetzal Hall organization open to girls living at Quetzal Hall and to graduates who lived in the dorm.

Organizations that have regained on-campus status are Kappa Alpha Psi, Phi Mu, Alpha Sigma Phi and Phi Delta Kappa.


Recently, Stone was a luncheon guest at a meeting in the Lafayette Hotel. He received two new books for library use from the local chapter of Hadassah.

I realize that there were many reasons for the relatively disappointing attendance at Dr. Rao's lecture and other "WUS Week" events, undoubtedly one of these was the general student apathy for international affairs and campus activity in general, but by far the biggest factor was simply that no one knew clearly what WUS was.

I had not begun soon enough to have a long-previous, intellectual, factual picture presented in the paper. When "WUS Week" came it was a shot story with no previous build-up. You, as Aztec Editor, have established a WUS editor who will have articles once a week discussing WUS, its approach, its international historical implications, its place on college campuses, etc.

The following statistics show that other schools believe in the importance of WUS and value the uniqueness of it as a different approach to world problems. Last year Berkeley gave \$8,300, Stanford \$1,000, Southern California \$2,000, and Tech \$2,000, Redlands \$1,000.

I believe that our experience this year can be a step in the right direction, so my characterization of our "Week as the most successful feature along this line" is from a one-part point of view, showing an improvement in the beginning which I believe will evolve into a great tradition of activity on campus.

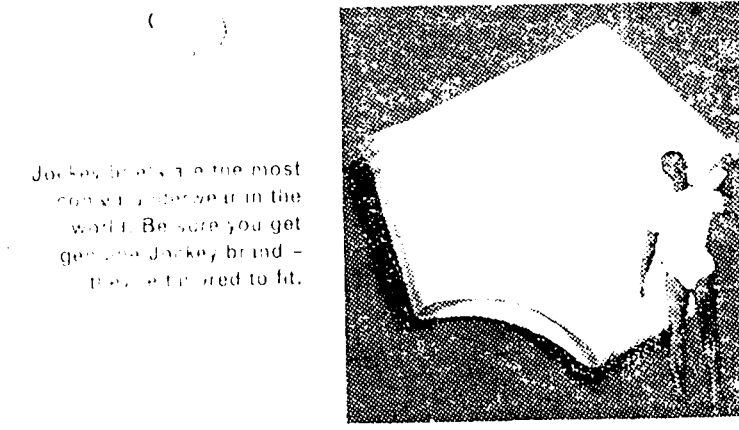

Survey Discloses Residents Believe Russia Outpointed

Forty-one per cent of 400 San Diego residents who participated in a psychology department survey feel that the United States is ahead of Russia in engineering and physical science.

This survey, conducted by the public opinion measurement class during November and December, consisted of interviews with 200 men and 200 women in finding the opinions on 13 issues.

Dr. Oscar J. Kaplan, professor of psychology and director of this civic problems survey, said, "It should be noted that this survey was made during the period when the Russians placed Sputniks I and II in orbit, and before the American satellite was successfully launched."

U.S. LEADS RUSSIA

The survey revealed also that 78 per cent of the participants felt that the United States led Russia in medical science.

Forty-five per cent of the residents felt that there would be no third World War involving Russia and the United States within the next 10 years. The survey showed that 28 per cent felt there would be another war, while 24 per cent were undecided.

As compared with the 1950's, the 1960's should be more prosperous, according to 42 per cent of the interviewees. Also, 41 per cent favored an extra month and a half of vacation as opposed to a four-day week. Thirty-five per cent favored this shorter week, while only eight per cent wanted the present situation to remain.

CHAMBER SELECTED

Given a list of nine San Diego City organizations and asked which one did the most to push civic projects, 41 per cent selected the San Diego Chamber of Commerce.

Ninety per cent approved of attracting new, non-smog-producing industries to San Diego, while 72 per cent favored the establishment of a State Mental Hospital here.

This is the seventh civic problems survey conducted by the psychology department.

'Much Ado About Nothing' Plays To Appreciative Few

The Aztec Theatre Guild marked the beginning of the spring theater season with the first of its four performances of one of Shakespeare's wittiest comedies, "Much Ado About Nothing." In spite of a few first night fluffs and a soggy, somewhat scant (although appreciative) audience, the performance was generally impressive. The director, Hunton Sellman of the Speech Arts Department, blended music, spectacle, dialogue, and comedy in proportion that kept viewers alert.

The charming wranglers, Beatrice and Benedick, were played by Bonnie Gould and Dale Muchmore, both veteran SDS performers. Considering the Shakespeare's rapid-paced high comedy is a challenge to the most seasoned actors, the students' efforts should be commended.

It would be difficult to find one more dashing than Muchmore in his various costumes. He moves with ease and grace, but his delivery and character portrayal are unconvincing. He is, however, considerably better in pantomime, and some of the finest acting was

done in the conspiracy scene, in which Don Pedro, Claudio, and Leonato, played by Joe Bousard, Michael Garvey, and Ed Seamon, allowed Benedick to overhear their lie that Beatrice is "desperately in love with Benedick."

The ladies were less amusing in the parallel scene, as Miss Gould (a young woman of notable talent) put her best self forward in the repartee with Benedick, and Miss Geer excelled in the serious scenes. As Hero, Darlene Geer, a charming newcomer to the Little Theatre, gave a polished and sympathetic performance. A sibilant S may be her only foible.

The tedious Dogberry (Dick McLaughlin) got the hardest laughs of the evening for his role of the "perfect ass." Garvey did as well as he could with the difficult role of the on-and-off Claudio. He showed zest in his humorous lines, and, unlike some of the others, was aware of the music in Shakespeare's words.

Al Pickett's part of Don John, the villain, is unimportant, but it certainly should not have been underplayed out of existence. And Jack Walsh, as the accomplice, should practice his lines.

One of the minor roles deserving of special mention is Frier Francis, played by Harris "Rockward," who spoke clearly and with comprehension.

Don Parnell, who designed the stage settings to fulfill the requirement for "his master's theme," kept the background appropriately colorful and bright. Perhaps the set could have been simpler, however, especially in the final scene, in which distracting "clouds" drew puzzled eye upward.

Final performances will be at 8:30 tonight and Saturday.

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

Pinch Single Leads Aztecs To Victory

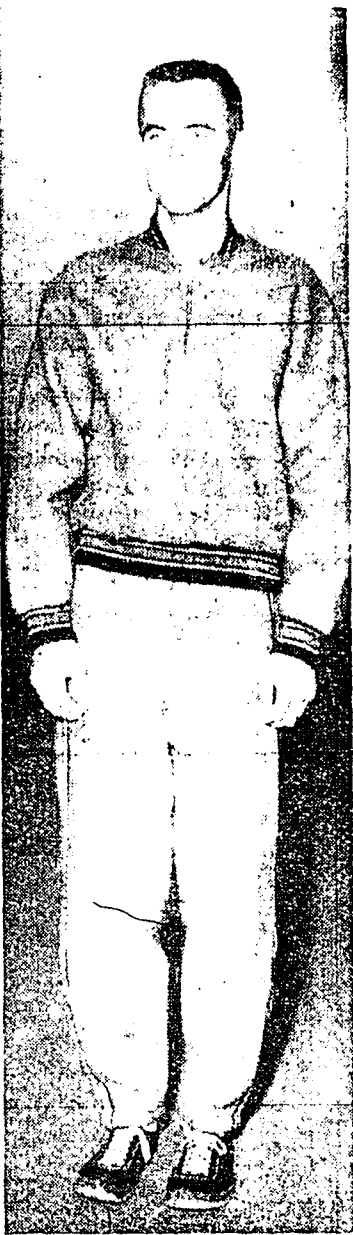
San Diego State's varsity baseball team scored three runs in the sixth inning to edge Stanford University 3-2. The game was played Tuesday on the Aztec diamond.

Netmen Risk Unbeaten Mark Against Non-Conference Foe

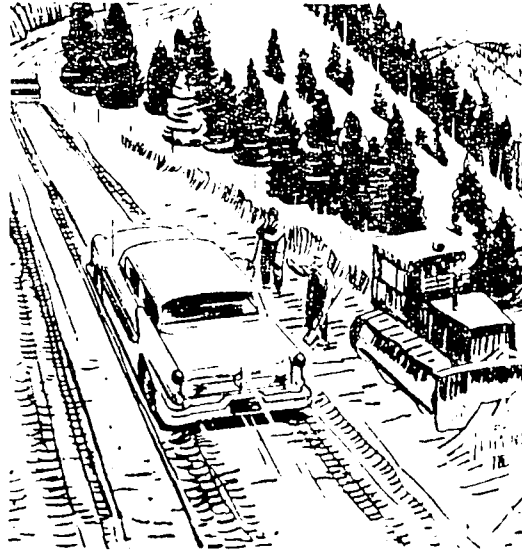

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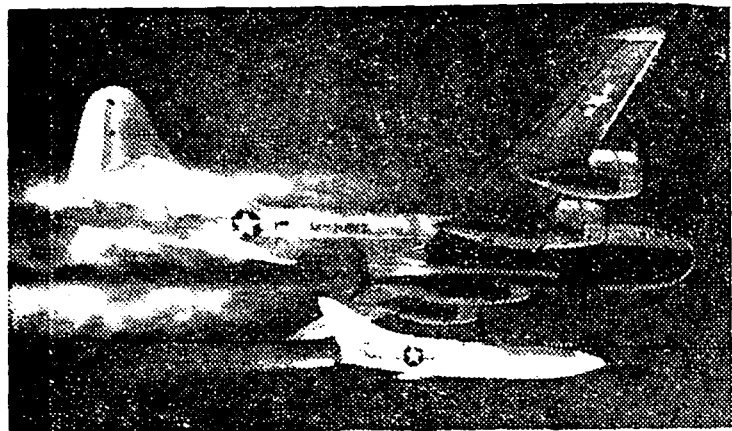
